## **Subject:** Direct Access to Audiology Services

1 2 3 4	Whereas, audiologists are professionals with Master's and/or Doctoral Degrees in audiology who are uniquely educated and trained in the evaluation, assessment, diagnosis, management, treatment and prevention of hearing and balance problems, and
5 6 7	Whereas, audiologists are regulated by state licensure or registration in all fifty states and the District of Columbia, and
8 9 10	Whereas, the Medicare statute recognizes state licensure as the appropriate standard for determining who is a qualified audiologist, and
11 12	Whereas, the Office of Personnel Management allows federal employees and Members of Congress to directly access audiologists through the Federal Employees Health Benefit Plan, and
13 14 15 16 17 18	Whereas, veteran's, who have completed the necessary requirements to establish eligibility for healthcare services through the Department of Veteran's Affairs (VA), have been afforded direct access to audiology services since 1992 and the administration has reported this policy allows the VA to provide high quality, efficient and cost effective hearing care to veterans, and
19 20 21	Whereas, all other third party payers, with the exception of Medicare, allow beneficiaries direct access to audiologists, and
22 23	Whereas, audiologists are charged with determining the medical necessity of the diagnostic tests performed when beneficiaries are provided direct access to their services, and

27 28 29	Whereas, the diagnostic tests performed by the audiologist are required prior to a medical diagnosis by a physician, and
30 31 32 33	Whereas, sensorineural hearing loss accounts for 90% or more of hearing loss in adult patients, and
34 35 36	Whereas, audiologists are educated to recognize problems requiring medical attention and would immediately refer those patients to a physician for medical treatment, and
37 38	Whereas, hearing loss is a major barrier to patients remaining active members of society, and
39 40 41	Whereas, hearing loss left untreated often results in patients suffering from psychosocial disorder including anxiety, isolation and depression, and

42	Whereas, Medicare beneficiaries do not need a physician referral to see a dentist, oral surgeon,
43	podiatrist, optometrist, chiropractor, clinical nurse specialist, clinical psychologist, clinical; social
44	worker, nurse practitioner or physician assistant,
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46	Resolved, that the American Academy of Audiology supports direct access to audiologists for
47	Medicare beneficiaries and any patient in need of audiology services.
